
#### A. Colonial America: A Passion for Plants

- John Bartram; botanist, collector, and the rise of plant exchanges between the Colonies and Europe.
- Prince Nursery, 1737 first Colonial nursery, visited by Washington, Adams, Jefferson, Monroe
- Development of transportation methods for sending plants across oceans.
- Landreth Seed begins, serving the needs of the working class.

#### B. Post-Revolution America: The Useful and the Beautiful

- George Washington, the plantsman, commits to adding an all-native plant garden to Mount Vernon.
- North American plants find a home in Europe.
- Lewis and Clark Expedition nets a vast collection of seeds and specimens.
- Parsons Nursery, 1838 Flushing, NY and the sale of exotic plants
- Nursery expansion heads to the Midwest and Georgia, Virginia, and South Carolina emerge as centers of exchange and production.
- First plant patent granted


## E. Post World War II: The Suburban Garden Boom

- Halka Nurseries opens
- Federal Highway Act expands plant shipment possibilities
